

I charge you therefore before God, and the Lord Jesus Christ, who shall judge the quick and the dead at his appearing and his kingdom; Preach the word; be instant in season, out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort with all long-suffering and doctrine. For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine; but after their own lusts shall they heap to themselves teachers, having itching ears; And they shall turn away their ears from the truth, and shall be turned to fables But watch you in all things, endure afflictions, do the work of an evangelist, make full proof of your ministry.

2 Timothy 4:1-5

Paul's exhortation to Timothy echoes in our hearts. In this almost a year and a half of ministry in Paraguay our constant prayer has been for God to show us doors of opportunity for the gospel. And indeed, the Lord has shown us many opportunities. We have traveled through different cities in Paraguay and seen closely different scenarios and realities in the country. Along with the political, economic, and social problems that are evident is the spiritual problem. There is no perfect society in the world because human beings are not perfect, and we know this from Scripture. All has to do with the problem of sin.

Since its beginnings, Paraguay has received a wrong recipe of the "bread of life." Catholicism is the predominant religion. It is common to hear from its followers that eternal life can be inherited by seeking piety, practicing charity, and being faithful to the (Catholic) Church—a "gospel" that mentions Jesus but positions Him as an aide to the salvation I'm working for. After all, good works are the currency that can purchase God's forgiveness that comes from the cross. In this way many Paraguayans live an endless and still uncertain search for God's forgiveness. How we yearn for an opportunity to explain to them that God offers complete redemption freely by His Grace through faith in the work of His Son Jesus Christ!

The other face of Christianity that is growing in Paraguay is that of those who have distanced themselves from the "preaching of the cross" to the "preaching of personal motivation." They consider themselves evangelical believers, and their most quoted catchphrase is, "You are a champion!" Other ones like "you will succeed," and "God has the best for you" are also very common. For many of these, Jesus came to earth solely to make them happy and prosperous. There is no message of salvation. Sin ceases to be what separates us from God and what puts us under His righteous judgment and becomes only that which prevents us from being happier in this life. Again, there is no gospel! They don't want God's forgiveness. They are just looking for another victory for their collection and Jesus is the best coach of all. Obviously, we don't agree with that stance either.

FOZ DO IGUAÇU - BRAZIL

Since last year we have been conducting Bible studies in the Brazilian city of Foz do Iguaçu, bordering Paraguay right across the river from us. There is a faithful group of participants there who yearn and pray for a church where the sound doctrine of Scripture is taught. Some of this group came to the faith through these studies. We are praying that God will raise among them men who desire to be trained to serve and lead so this group may become an indigenous church one day.

We thank God for the life of a young Paraguayan evangelist, Rodrigo Paredes, whom God used to open this door. It was through him, his family, and contacts that we got free access to the prison to visit and hold services there. We implemented the correspondence Bible course of our partner organization, Prison Mission Association, in one of the main prisons of Paraguay located in the city of Encarnación, five hours from where we live. Currently, more than 30 inmates are enrolled in our "Noble Berean Bible Course." We have been visiting them on a monthly basis.
