Dear Prayer Partners,

We said a heart-wrenching goodbye to our precious daughters on December 31, 2012, as we boarded the plane for Central America. God has given us this Spanish language, many new friends, and many open doors to minister over these past four years! As we look ahead to May 3, 2017, we anticipate many changes. Please *pray* for us as we transition into our one-year home assignment. Here are some specific prayer requests:

- Please pray that we will choose to trust God rather than worry.
- Please pray for a house to live in.
- Please pray for the renewal of our Nicaraguan Residence Visas.
- Please pray that God will preserve the Spanish and Nicaraguan sign language in our minds.
- Please pray for these precious Nicaraguans, pictured in the prayer clock on the back of this letter, that we
 are leaving behind for one year. Since there are many requests, perhaps this clock can help you to pray for
 some at different times in the day.

We are celebrating how God worked in the hearts of eight valley children to want to receive Jesus into their hearts! Sally was preparing to tell the Bible story of Jesus' birth and wanted a visual to communicate that the innkeeper had no room for Jesus. She wanted to use this story to ask the kids if they had room for Jesus in their hearts. God used Debby Chapman to give her an idea of a heart shaped visual with a door, that flipped to become an inn. It was perfect! We created these and used them in The Valley. The children understood and all eight wanted to receive Jesus into their hearts! Oh what joy!!!

It has been good developing relationships with Eduardo, Falex, Roberto, and Darwin from the Saturday morning English class. Eduardo has been faithfully attending both the Spanish and English Bible studies. It has been encouraging to see him grow. When Jeff first met him over a year ago, he was a skeptic. He told Jeff that he had many questions and doubts about God and wanted to pursue philosophy. Now, he seems to believe in God and Jesus as his Savior. He still has some awesome questions, which Jeff encourages and directs back to what God says in His Word.

In the English class, one girl did a presentation on sexuality. After her presentation, another student looked right at Jeff and asked him his opinion about homosexuality. Jeff said a quick prayer and the Lord led him to some verses to share with the class about this sin and God's love and forgiveness.

Jeff is so encouraged by his regular meetings with his Spanish tutor, Alberth. These sessions devoted to creating Bible studies, first on some names of God and now on Psalm 119, have opened the door for several biblical discussions, including salvation and good works. We had opportunities to talk about salvation and the place of good works in a person's life. This time with Alberth has become so much more than just improving Jeff's Spanish!
