A friend who came to Kapenta to do training in 2004 has returned. His name is Daud Mbongo and he is the head of Agricultural Research at Uyole Government Research Station outside of Mbeya. On the day Kim and I visited Daud and his staff in Uyole, they had grafted 398 avocado trees and only one of the grafts didn't "take." That's pretty impressive if you ask me! Daud and an assistant named Pastor Fredrick came the weekend of the 24-26 of March to train local people in horticulture. These guys are experts at grafting and budding fruit trees. They have become efficient at taking what God gave to us, then creating and cultivating something new. He and his team make something beneficial using the raw products that the Lord has blessed us with.

For the past 26 years we have worked under the auspices of a church called Kanisa la Neema (Grace Church of Tanzania). Both Kanisa la Neema and Grace Ministries International are restructuring their relationship. This restructuring will cause us to apply for a new Tanzanian resident permit under a new African host organization founded sepa-
